### Assignment 0

*This assignment should be completed as soon as possible. Your other assignments cannot be graded until this one has been done.*

1. In your CS-184 class account home directory, create a sub-directory named `public.html`. In this directory place an HTML page name `index.html`. This web page should contain:
  - (a) Your name
  - (b) Your preferred e-mail address
  - (c) A photo of yourself.
  - (d) Any other information about yourself that you think is interesting and would like to share.
2. The files referenced by the above mentioned web page should all be contained in the `public.html` directory.
3. The directory, `public.html`, and the files in it should be world readable. Your home directory should be world searchable but *not* world readable.
4. *Optional, but suggested:* Create a file named `.forward` in your CS-184 class account home directory that contains a single line of text. This line of text should be the e-mail address that you check most regularly. This file will cause any e-mail sent to your cs184 account to forward to whatever address you put in the file. (Check that the forwarding works by sending your cs184 account e-mail and see if it shows up in your regular e-mail.)
5. Use the *turnin* program to submit a single text file with your name, student ID number, CS-184 account username, and the text "I set up my web page." Each item should be on a separate line. Direction on using the submission system are found at <http://inst.eecs.berkeley.edu/cgi-bin/pub.cgi?file=grading.help>.

From time to time, important notices will be sent out by e-mail. If you don't follow these steps, you will probably not get those messages. Also, don't forget to check to the class news group, *ucb.class.cs184*, on a regular basis.

Note that the above, including the photo of yourself, are not optional. The photo should also be clearly recognizable as you, because in a large class I need some way to map names to faces. If you have a privacy objection to posting a picture of yourself on the web, then use an `htaccess` file to either limit the page so that it can only be accessed from inside Berkeley.EDU or so that it requires a password. If you chose to place a password, you'll need to let the graders, TA, and instructor know what it is. Also, **DO NOT** put your student ID on your webpage.
